


Europe will remain an attractive destination for migrants in the coming decades.

- All six migration narratives assume a continued pressure to migrate in developing countries
- In all narratives, Europe will remain one of the preferred destination regions of migrants







European need for immigrant labour will likely increase in the coming decades

- Population ageing and the decline of working-age populations in Europe will likely increase the demand for immigrant labour
- Part could be met by increasing labour force participation rates among older people and among women and especially among migrant populations already in Europe






Migration policies cannot completely control migration flows

- During recent years, anti-immigrant rhetoric has resurfaced and parties who promise to curtail migration have had electoral successes in several European countries.
- Even restrictive migration policies can not completely control migration flows.



Party leaders of Sweden's new center-right government







Harness the opportunities of circular migration

- Policy makers in Europe must plan for future migration flows to Europe and make these developments beneficial for all sides – receiving countries, sending countries, migrants and their families
- Acknowledgment of the beneficial role of circular migration in both the countries of origin and destination










Consider opportunities offered by remote work

- During the pandemic, digital tools have become widely used to work remotely
- It has become customary in many sectors to combine work at the office with remote working from home or even from second homes






Consider gender aspects when developing immigration and integration policies

- Around half of the world's migrants are women
- Despite different impacts on men and women, migration and integration policies often do not explicitly consider gender and the different impact of laws on men and women




Female workers at fish processing plant in Sudureyri, Iceland






Harness the opportunities of immigration for rural and remote areas

- Many rural and remote areas in Europe suffer from outmigration and depopulation
- If international immigrants could be encouraged to move and stay in rural and remote areas, this could counteract many of the effects of depopulation and revive declining areas








Development opportunities: Increase opportunities in sending countries

- FUME research shows that one of the key motivators to migrate is a lack of opportunities in home regions and countries
- Narrowing the gap between economic growth of Europe and the developing countries is the best way to reduce immigration to the continent
- Many young people want to stay in their home countries
