Why do people decide to migrate?

Temporality to the decision to migrate

- Begins well before actual mobility
 Escalating violence to immediate threat
 Watchful resource gathering
- Temporality of migration itself
 - $_{\rm O}$ Initially assumed to be short term
 - As barriers get entrenched, more long-term plan
- Duration of the journey is intersectional
 Sometimes long, several hubs and transition points
 Skills, gender, class, finances determine timeline

Findings based on:

Semi-structured interviews with irregular (settled) migrants

35 interviews in Belgium and Sweden each

Questions examined trajectory to Europe, pre-departure, in transit, en route to Europe and post-arrival



Decision-making is dynamic and intersectional

o Rarely final, fluid even after 'settling'

$_{\odot}$ Skills play a critical role

Access to information, EnglishAbility to work en route, learn local language

${\scriptstyle \odot}$ Gender impacts materiality of the move

Likelihood of travelling alone
Intersects with age and class, in particular.

$\ensuremath{\circ}$ Aspirations are critical

oClosure of schools, job opportunities

- \circ No opportunity for legalisation in transit countries
- o Access to labour market, Human Rights and a chance to 'build a good life'
